On behalf of the Board of Directors, welcome to the 2022 Bates Film Festival! This is an historic year for us – a coming of age year! We are proud to present a record number of films thanks to the support of a record number of sponsors! Forty-one different departments, programs, centers, offices, and student activity groups from Bates College have contributed to this event. In addition, 12 Freeport businesses and individuals have lent their support. All of this has allowed us to offer a bigger, better festival – one that will screen most of its selections in real movie theaters with beautiful picture and sound and comfortable seats. And all of it is still free and open to the public... the way movies should be!

The BFF is organized by students in "Film Festival Studies," a seminar taught in the Rhetoric, Film, and Screen Studies Department at Bates College. Students are involved in every aspect of this festival's planning and execution. They have rewritten the mission statement, raised a record amount of funds, screened films, programmed a schedule, worked with industry professionals and faculty members to explore programming options, and produced many of the events that will take place over the next five days. They have also written most of the copy that appears in this program. And these first-time festival organizers have done it all in 11 weeks, an insanely short period of time for any festival but especially for a festival of this caliber.

One area where the students' voices are most clearly heard is the panel discussions that will take place on the Bates campus and at Meetinghouse Arts. Meetinghouse is a welcomong space and the home of the Arts and Cultural Alliance of Freeport, a strong advocate for the Bates Film Festival's move to Freeport. This year, we have increased the number of panel discussions substantially, a direct response to feedback we received on past festivals, where attendees told us that

some of the best and most memorable moments of the festival took place during discussions. We are offering 14 panels this year, each of which was inspired in some way by our lineup of films. Most of these panels have been produced by students and they look to bring activists, filmmakers, political leaders, faculty, students, and young people into conversation around important issues. Make sure you attend some of these events. You won't regret it.

This year, our lineup of films includes 29 titles! They include an array of documentaries, fiction narratives, and shorts, and many are making their Maine premieres. Additionally, we've programmed a handful of 30th or 40th anniversaries screenings, offering an opportunity to revisit classics or discover neglected films on the big screen with an audience. There isn't a bad film in the lineup so see as many as you can. And then, there are our guests! Biographer and Lewiston native Mark Griffin throws a 100th birthday party for Judy Garland. Director Marilyn Agrelo and producers Trevor Crafts and Ellen Scherer Crafts bring their 2021 Sundance favorite Street Gang: How We Got to Sesame Street to Freeport for a Friday night screening and Q&A. Pulitzer Prize-nominated novelist Chang-rae Lee joins us via Zoom to discuss Coming Home Again. Emmy Award-winning actor and Bates legend John Shea ('70) returns home to screen Grey Lady. Oscar-winning director Bruce W. Smith travels to Maine for a 30th anniversary screening of Bébé's Kids, the first animated Hollywood release to focus on people of color. And filmmaker extraordinaire John Turturro will be here for a 30th anniversary screening of his writing and directorial debut, Mac, as well as a screening of Romance & Cigarettes, another film he wrote and directed. It's a stellar lineup! We are so proud of what we have been able to accomplish, and so happy to present it to you in person. We hope you walk away from the 2022 Bates Film Festival with as many memories as we have from organizing it.

Meet Our Board of Directors

Jon Cavallero is an Associate Professor and Chair of Rhetoric, Film, and Screen Studies at Bates College. He founded the Bates Film Festival in 2018 in order to connect current Bates students who are interested in film and television with alumni/ae and parents working in the industry. Over its first two festivals, BFF has shown over 50 films from 6 different continents and brought over 25 guest filmmakers to campus. In addition to his work with the festival, Cavallero is a widely published author. His book Hollywood's Italian American Filmmakers: Capra, Scorsese, Savoca, Coppola, and Tarantino was published by the University of Illinois Press in 2011. He is also the co-editor (with Laura E. Ruberto) of Italian American Review's special issue on "Italian Americans and Television." His essays have appeared in numerous journals including Cinema Journal, Journal of Film and Video, The Journal of Popular Culture, MELUS, and The Journal of Popular Film & Television. Cavallero currently sits on the editorial boards of Journal of Film and Video and Diasporic Italy. He earned his B.A. from Georgetown University, his M.A. from Penn State University, and his Ph.D. from Indiana University - Bloomington. At Bates, he teaches courses on American and world cinema with a particular focus on the representation of race, ethnicity, and gender.

Gene Chen is a senior at Bates College majoring in Art and Visual Culture and minoring in Rhetoric, Film, and Screen Studies. She is a member of AASIA (Asian American Students in Action) as well as the International Club. 

John Shea ('70)

Primetime Emmy Award winner John Shea, one of the most versatile actors of his generation, is also an awardwinning filmmaker. Grey Lady, which he wrote, acted in and produced, is a romantic thriller set on Nantucket island. Lionsgate Films distributes



internationally. Shea produced the *Grey Lady* soundtrack for Spotify, iTunes and 120 international streaming sites.

As an actor he's received critical acclaim for fleshing out a wide range of dimensional characters for stage, screen and television. Shea burst onto the international scene in Costa-Gavras' Academy Award winning political thriller *Missing* which won the Palme D'Or at the Cannes Film Festival, 1982. Starring opposite Sissy Spacek, he began a tradition of working with talented actresses. His sociopathic Lex Luthor opposite Teri Hatcher in *Lois and Clark, The New Adventures of Superman* was an international hit for Warner Brothers.

Diverse work continued opposite Sharon Stone in the political thriller Agent X; playing Jospeh in the biblical epic The Nativity opposite Madeline Stowe; as Ann-Margaret's young lover in Alan Alda's romantic comedy A New Life; as the stalker of French star Natalie Baye in the thriller Lune de Miel which Shea shot in both French and English 39 (Honeymoon). He made his feature film debut starring opposite Helen Mirren in the British film noir Hussy (1980); challenging choices continued with Windy City opposite Kate Capshaw (Best Actor, Montreal International Film Festival); with Bill Nighy in Hitler's SS; with Jodie Foster in Stealing Home; with Kelly McGillis in Israeli epic Unsettled Land; as Robert Kennedy in the BBC's Kennedy with Martin Sheen; with Eli Wallach in The Impossible Spy, with Lea Thompson in the romantic comedy The Trouble With the Truth, to name a few of his fifty films shot around the world.

Shea made his Broadway debut at age 26 as a Polish yeshiva boy in Yentl (Theatre World Award as Most Promising Actor). He's starred in twenty plays on and off Broadway and on London's West End, sharing the theatrical stage with, among others, Meryl Streep, Sigourney Weaver, Linda Hunt, Estelle Parsons, Anne Jackson, Kate Burton, Bianca Jagger and Estelle Parsons. He's starred in five television series including international hits *Gossip Girl* and Marvel's *Mutant X*. Shea's currently Artistic Director Emeritus of the Theatre Workshop of Nantucket.

Southie (1998), his debut as a screenwriter and film director, is a drama set in the tough Irish enclave of South Boston. Starring Donnie Whalberg and Rose McGowan, *Southie* won Best Picture at the Seattle International Film Festival and is distributed by Lionsgate. He is currently producing *The Junkie Priest* a film which he wrote and will direct in New York.

A graduate of Bates College, Shea studied acting with his first mentor Lavinia Schaeffer. Bill Beard taught him stage directing. At Bates Shea also played football, ran track, was captain of the varsity debating team (under Brooks Quimby and Tom Moser), and was co-editor of the literary magazine, helped by mentor John Tagliabue. Shea studied acting and directing at the Yale School of Drama (MFA'73). At the invitation of founder Lee Strasberg, he observed at the Actor's Studio in New York. Married to artist Melissa MacLeod, he has three children, Jake, Miranda and Caiden and is deeply grateful for everything he learned at Bates.

Bruce W. Smith

Multiple award-winning animation artist Bruce W. Smith is creator and executive producer of Disney+'s "The Proud Family: Louder and Prouder," the long-anticipated revival of the groundbreaking animated series "The Proud Family."

An accomplished director, producer and animator, Smith has been part of the animation industry for over three decades. He is best known for creating and executiveproducing Disney Channel's hit series "The Proud Family" and "The Proud Family Movie." Most



recently Smith served as one of three directors of the Academy Awardwinning short "Hair Love."

During his tenure at Walt Disney Animation Studios, Smith supervised animation on many animated feature films including "The Princess and the Frog," specifically for evil villain Dr. Facilier; "Winnie the Pooh;" "Tarzan" and "The Emperor's New Groove." His gift for unique character design led him into visual development for the Studio's other projects such as "Wreck-It Ralph" and "Frozen." He was also the lead animator on the short film "Tangled Ever After."

A California Institute of the Arts alumni, Smith co-founded Jambalaya Studio; an animation company whose goal is to generate both racially and ethnically diverse projects for all mediums, to produce over 50 episodes for Disney Channel's "The Proud Family" and "The Proud Family Movie." His additional credits include "Space Jam," "Who Framed Roger Rabbit," "A Goofy Movie," "Bébé's Kids" and "Happily Ever After: Fairy Tales for Every Child."

In December 2020, Smith and his producing partner, Ralph Farquhar, entered a wide-ranging, multiyear overall deal with Disney that calls for them to produce animated and live-action series and movies for Disney Branded Television. The agreement provides separate funding for them to find and develop emerging talent as well as leverage their combined experience to bring unique projects and voices to Disney.

For his lead role in the Coen Brothers' "Barton Fink" Turturro won the Best Actor Award at the Cannes Film Festival, and the David Donatello Award.

John Turturro can be currently seen in "*The Batman*" playing Carmine Falcone and will be the voice of a character in Guillermo del Toro and Mark Gustafson's animated feature, "*Pinocchio*".

He received the Camera D'Or Award at the Cannes Film Festival for "*Mac*", his directorial debut. Other films as director/ writer include "*Illuminata*" "*Romance & Cigarettes*" "*Passione*" "*Fading Gigolo*" and "*The Jesus Rolls*".

On Television, Turturro was nominated for a SAG Award for his portrayal of Howard Cosell in "*Monday Night Mayhem*" and again nominated for "*The Bronx is Burning*". He won an Emmy Award for his guest appearance on "*Monk*" and was nominated for a Golden Globe and a SAG Award for his performance in HBO's "*The Night Of*".

This film and the brave women who are its subjects make space for women of color in the #MeToo Movement. By highlighting the voices of Black women specifically (who are too often ignored and silenced), the film inspires conversations about #MeToo and serves as both a plea and a strategy for making social movements more inclusive. 


Shortly after World War II, war broke out in Palestine-Israel. Israelis know it as "The War of Independence" but Palestinians call it Nakba, the Palestinian Catastrophe. Alon Schwarz's *Tantura* portrays what occurred during the 1948 War. More importantly, the film uncovers some of the crimes committed and covered up by the Israeli state in the first phases of statehood, and how Israeli society has looked the other way and built its own narrative and founding myths. An important film that premiered at Sundance in January, *Tantura* has become increasingly relevant with the Russian invasion of Ukraine. The international community, led by the US and EU, have banded together in support of white, Ukrainian refugees, but Palestinian, Yemeni, and Syrian refugees continue to receive a fraction of that attention and aid. We hope this film will ignite discussions about current issues in foreign policy and the disparity between the treatment of white and non-white refugees in the West.
